Since its founding in 1855 as the first pediatric hospital in the United States, Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) has proudly been an active part of the Philadelphia community. CHOP is one of the top hospitals in *U.S. News & World Report*'s 2022–23 ranking of the nation's Best Children's Hospitals. Our doctors, nurses and scientists are advancing care for children with both rare and common diseases. Our breakthroughs in treating childhood cancer, congenital heart disease, fetal anomalies and many other diseases are saving lives and improving children's quality of life. We are just as devoted to keeping healthy children well and enhancing the well-being of entire families.


CHOP AND PENNSYLVANIA SHARE A COMMITMENT TO CHILDREN'S HEALTH

- CHOP's network consists of a large campus in Philadelphia, including our original pediatric hospital with 600+ licensed beds, our second hospital in King of Prussia with 80 beds, and more than 45 specialty care and primary care locations and community hospital affiliations in Pennsylvania (as well as other locations in New Jersey and New York).
- Nearly 69% of patients admitted to CHOP are from Pennsylvania (more than 20,602 Pa. admissions in fiscal year 2022).
- CHOP is the largest provider of inpatient care to sick children in Pennsylvania: 17% of pediatric hospital visits (about 1 in 6) for Pennsylvania residents were at CHOP (calendar year 2016*, excluding neonates).
- CHOP cares for a large number of Pennsylvania children with limited financial means. Nearly 49% of our inpatients are on Medicaid.
- Patients from 56 of the state's 67 counties were hospitalized at CHOP in fiscal year 2022.
- CHOP is striving to meet the increased demand for mental health services by opening the new Center for Advanced Behavioral Healthcare in 2022 for outpatient appointments and creating a new Behavioral Health and Crisis Center (opening late 2023) offering inpatient and emergency mental healthcare.

CHOP IS ONE OF THE WORLD'S LEADING PEDIATRIC RESEARCH FACILITIES

- Hundreds of investigators and thousands of other research staff work in more than 1,475,000 gross square feet of research space on the CHOP campus.
- Among research funding sources are external grants totaling approximately \$320 million annually, including approximately \$196.5 million in federal awards (fiscal year 2022).
- CHOP is home to the largest pediatric biorepository in the world, with capacity for 2.5 million tissue and DNA samples.
 The biorepository is used by researchers seeking genetic markers for a multitude of diseases, which can lead to more specific diagnoses and patient-centered treatments.
- CHOP researchers have contributed to the creation of gene therapy methods to cure some forms of inherited blindness and a breakthrough in cancer treatment that involves modifying the body's immune cells, called T cells, to seek out and destroy cancer cells.





THE CHOP CARE NETWORK PROVIDES WORLD-CLASS CARE, CLOSE TO HOME

- Partnerships with other Pennsylvania hospitals bring neonatal, emergency and pediatric inpatient care services to patients locally. Partners include:

- CHOP facilities provide outpatient surgery, imaging, and specialty, primary and urgent care to patients closer to home in fiscal year 2022.
 - Three Ambulatory Surgery Centers, in Bucks,
 Delaware and Montgomery counties: approximately
 5,400 surgeries
 - Pediatric Imaging Center in Montgomery County: approximately 39,000 imaging studies
 - Seven Specialty Care Centers, in Bucks, Chester,
 Delaware, Lancaster, Montgomery and Philadelphia counties: more than 145,000 patient visits. Including the Philadelphia Campus, there were more than 413,000 total patient visits
 - Four Urgent Care locations, in Bucks, Delaware and Montgomery counties: approximately 52,800 patient visits
 - 22 primary care locations in Eastern Pennsylvania: more than 506,000 patient visits. Including Cobbs Creek, Karabots and South Philadelphia, there were over 649,000 total visits

CHOP INVESTS IN PENNSYLVANIA

- More than 12,395 CHOP employees live in Pennsylvania. They earn more than \$748 million in wages and contribute more than \$23 million in state wage taxes (fiscal year 2018).
- More than 14,331 CHOP employees work in Philadelphia County. They earn more than \$904 million in wages and contribute nearly \$33 million in Philadelphia city wage taxes (fiscal year 2018).

CHOP'S PENNSYLVANIA-BASED TEACHING PROGRAMS ARE WORLD-RENOWNED

• CHOP has the largest and highest ranking (*U.S. News & World Report* 2023 ranking) pediatric residency training program in the country, with trainees in 81 accredited and non-accredited training programs, including 165 residents and 319 fellows (fiscal year 2022).

CHOP PROVIDES HIGHLY SPECIALIZED AND UNIQUE SERVICES FOR PA'S CHILDREN

- Pennsylvania children have access to services that others travel many miles for. In fiscal year 2022, CHOP patients came from 66 countries, all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- CHOP's high volume of patients enables the hospital to recruit and attract highly specialized physicians in many disciplines.
- CHOP is the only hospital in eastern Pennsylvania to provide a large number of specialized pediatric services and pediatric multidisciplinary clinics, including:
 - Lung and Heart Transplant Program
 - Thoracic Insufficiency Program
 - Complex Airway Disorders Program
 - Chronic Lung Disease Program
- CHOP is the only pediatric hospital in the state to provide the following services:
 - Fetal Surgery
 - Hyperinsulinism Program
 - Proton Therapy
- CHOP received patient transports from 100
 Pennsylvania hospitals, representing nearly
 64% of all acute care hospitals in the state
 (fiscal year 2018). CHOP's transport capabilities
 ensure that all Pennsylvania children can access
 the best care when needed.
