The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia is one of the top hospitals in *U.S. News & World Report's* 2015-16 ranking of the nation's Best Children's Hospitals. Our doctors, nurses and scientists are advancing care for children with both rare and common diseases; pioneering research in childhood cancer, congenital heart disease and fetal therapy; and making discoveries in the lab today that will become the lifesaving treatments of tomorrow.

We are committed to providing world-class services and improving the health of New Jersey's children.

CHOP and New Jersey share a commitment to children's health.

- Nearly 27 percent of patients admitted to CHOP are from the Garden State (7,744 admissions in fiscal year 2015).
- CHOP is the largest provider of inpatient care to sick children from New Jersey. Three of 10 pediatric hospital admissions for New Jersey residents occurred at CHOP (calendar year 2013*, excluding neonates). This is a significant increase from 9 percent in calendar year 2009.
- CHOP is the largest provider of inpatient care to New Jersey children covered by Medicaid: 37 percent of pediatric Medicaid hospital admissions for New Jersey residents occurred at CHOP (calendar year 2013*, excluding neonates). This is a significant increase from 11 percent in calendar year 2009.
- 32 percent of CHOP's New Jersey patient discharges are covered by Medicaid (calendar year 2013*).

CHOP serves children by offering exceptional care in a cost-effective setting, providing the best possible clinical outcomes as well as value and convenience.

The CHOP Care Network provides world-class care, close to home.

- CHOP's partnerships with New Jersey hospitals bring specialty services that are in short supply to patients locally, including neonatal, pediatric inpatient, and pediatric intensive care, as well as pediatric emergency medicine and cardiology services. Partner hospitals include:

- CHOP locations in New Jersey provide outpatient surgery, imaging, and specialty and primary care to patients closer to home. In fiscal year 2015, more than 225,000 patient encounters occurred at N.J. primary and specialty care locations, including:
 - Specialty Care & Surgery Center, Voorhees: More than 36,000 specialty care visits; more than 2,700 outpatient surgeries; more than 7,600 imaging studies
 - Atlantic County Specialty Care Center: More than 12,400 specialty care visits
 - Princeton at Plainsboro Specialty Care Center (formerly Princeton Specialty Care Center): More than 20,800 specialty care visits
 - Primary Care Centers in Gibbsboro, Cape May, Smithville, _ Somers Point, Mount Laurel and Burlington Township: More than 141,500 primary care visits
 - _ Children's Intensive Emotional and Behavioral Services in Mays Landing (behaviorally focused partial day hospital services, including full-day and extended-day programs): 5,891 total visits

CHOP's teaching programs are worldrenowned.

• CHOP has the largest and highest-ranking (U.S. News & World *Report* 2016 ranking) pediatric residency training program in the country, with trainees in 68 accredited and non-accredited training programs, including 149 residents and 280 fellows (fiscal year 2016).

CHOP employees have a positive financial impact in New Jersey.

- 2,170 CHOP employees live in New Jersey.
- They earn more than \$165 million in wages and contribute more than \$2.376 million in New Jersey state wage taxes (calendar year 2015).

CHOP provides highly specialized services for New Jersey's children.

- N.J. children have access to services that others travel many miles for. In fiscal year 2015, CHOP patients came from 33 countries, 47 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.
- CHOP's high volume of patients enables the Hospital to recruit and attract highly specialized physicians in many disciplines.
