## Formats for use

#### Flashcards

Notecard-sized flashcards can be printed four per page to view multiple choice questions on the front and answers with supplementary info on the back.

### Question sets

Single-sheet PDF files each include 10 multiple-choice questions on the front with answers and additional information on the back. Versions without answers are also available.

## Online game

Play randomized, 10-question rounds in one of four categories at vaccine.chop.edu/trivia.

- Use to play a competitive game during

#### The correct answers are:

1. B. Washington witnessed many epidemics, including the yellow fever epidemic in 1793. In his teenage years, Washington was often sick and fell ill with diphtheria, malaria and smallpox at ages 15, 17 and 19, respectively. 2. C. Eleanor Abbott designed Candy Land in 1945 while she recovered from polio in a San Diego hospital ward. Candy Land was inducted into the National Toy Hall of Fame in 2005.
